

to make amends and a new effort in a new way. We have been born to make progress and bring about evolution. Then why worry, if the road is zigzag and strewn with thorny hedges? It has got to be crossed. T. H. Huxley has written somewhere that the failures at the primary stage come to teach us ways of practical life. He emphasises more than once that defeat or failure is but a way for betterment, to which there is no end. Our young readers, on going through the pages of history you will find hardly any example of success in the first effort.
