My advice to the youngsters is: never think of defeat, have confidence in yourself believing that I have come to win. Never say 'die'.

The above is one of the many examples when defeat is turned into victory, and victory into defeat. It all depends on how much one feels confident of oneself. The old adage 'as you think, so you become', is still true and will continue to be so for all times
